Goal #1close State Goalclose

In the 2023-2024 school year, DFMS will continue our Multi-Tiered System of Support focusing on academic achievement in core subjects, with an emphasis on math and reading, for all students as measured by the number of students passing their classes (Grade Reports), students increasing 1% point in proficiency and growth scores (RISE, WIDA), and growth from beginning to end of year assessments.

Current year reading proficiency reports from Acadience, iReady and CAPTI as well as last year's end of level RISE and WIDA scores indicate the need for monitoring student growth in all core areas with a specific need for an emphasis on targeted intervention in reading and math proficiency. Panorama data will be used throughout the school year to track grades, attendance, SEL, and student sub-groups. Final progress towards goal will be measured by RISE end of level proficiency and growth scores, end of term grade reports, WIDA scores, and beginning and ending of year proficiency scores.

Action Plan Steps and Expendituresclose

- 1. Replace and maintain technology resources and cover cost of on-line apps or on-line curriculum subscriptions, or licenses: SCOPE Scholastic reading magazine subscription, Derivita math software additional licenses to cover the cost over the STEM grant, and help with covering the cost of new ELA textbook adoption of My Perspectives from SAVAAS.
- 2. Hire additional interns, teachers, or offer current teachers extended day as needed to lower class size, facilitate additional leveled reading classes, and enhance student course offerings.
- 3. Augment skill building funds and facilitate targeted, individual student remediation for at-risk, ELL, special education, and struggling learners through math tutors, study hall technicians, and reading technicians.
- 4. Implement targeted Tier I, II, and Tier three reading interventions through LETRS and Science of Reading professional development training for all English and reading teachers and the peer coaching model.
- 5. Promote and provide supplies for increased opportunities for advanced learners such as Maker Spaces, Battle of the Books, field trips, math competitions, Robotics, Gifted and Talented Curiosity class, Odyssey of the Mind, science fair, We the People Competition, poetry slam, etc.
